"He says they don't want a conference centre in the village, Your Imperial Majesty."

The report issuing from the public enquiry, permitting the university to build a conference centre, phase 1, at the Villa on the A525 has been forwarded to the parish council. The findings of the inspector were that the new building would not increase the traffic or traffic hazards on the A525, obstruct the view of residents or detract from the appearance of the village. In fact, so unimpressed with the Borough Council and Parish Council arguments was the inspector that he has even awarded costs of the enquiry to the University and the Borough will have to pay! Insult to injury, you may say, more so now that the Parish Council has been asked to approve planning permission for lorries to enter the site on the A525, between the third and fourth trees on the left of the Villa. The least the Parish Council can hope for is that the University will derive great wealth from the enterprise and bestow grace and favour upon the village, thereby attempting to heal the rift between 'town' and 'gown' that the exercise has occasioned. Unless, of course, it transpires that money isn't the solution to all problems ...

In the meantime, parishioners will be prostrating themselves before the site lorries and chaining themselves to the JCB's in an attempt to assuage hurt feelings and overcome

the frustration of not being listened to.


PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Improved drainage in Church Bank, Church Fields and Pepper Street can be expected in the near future, also Redheath. The other blue spots will be monitored and attempts to keep drainage channels free of rubbish and debris will be made. The springs in Church Fields are to be monitored. Whilst the borough council officers were touring the area, the spring had dried up, only to bounce back the next day, as wet as ever.

SCHOOL TRANSPORT

Free bus passed for some children has been a bone of contention for some time. Anyone living less than 3 miles from the school is ineligible even though the route is unsafe for walking. A recent court case endorsed the fact that the nature of the route was as important as other factors. The parish council is considering raising such an issue with Staffordshire in an attempt to reverse their current ruling.

FREE TREES

National Tree Week this year is from 28 November to 6 December. The main theme is urban tree planting and there are limited funds available to assist parish councils with any tree planting they may wish to undertake. The parish council is considering this with a view to inter-planting between the decaying limes along the A525.

The parish council awarded £100 for reference books to the village school PTA, using section 137 of the Local Government Act 1972.

The University library has kindly given a leaflet rack to the parish council for its library facility. Mr. H. Jones is to make some minor repairs to it and then it will be in use in the foyer
