Lorries from Podmore Hall Pit



Speeding along Pepper Street

After a letter of complaint about speeding along Pepper Street, the local police force carried out observations in the area, which in the words of a Chief Inspector were "inconclusive". He went on to say "the matter was referred to the Northern Traffic Group at Hanley who operate radar equipment. checks have been carried out on that particular stretch of road in October ... when the average speed of vehicles using it was assessed to be 32 mph... they do not have the resources available to carry out protracted checks on a particular area. The indication in this particular case is that although there may well be occasional speeding offences on that stretch of road the majority of drivers are observing the speed limit."

Drains

Dye testing in Mr. Kettle's culvert was carried out. However, it was reported that the dye did not 'show'. Further investigations are to be carried out. It has been suggested that the local drain expert, Mr. H. Lafford, be called in to resolve the matter.

Speeding along Quarry Bank Road Complaints have been received about speeding along Quarry Bank Road. Lorries have also been observed using the school entrance as a turning point. The situation is not helped these days by parents parking outside the New Vicarage on the narrowest part of the road. The parking situation has been exacerbated by all children leaving school at the end of the day at more or less the same time, and the fact that with more students and conferences at the Hawthorns, there are fewer spaces in the car park. It has been suggested that ramps be installed along Quarry Bank Road and that yellow lines be extended past the New Vicarage. A letter is to be sent to the Warden re: students speeding along the road.

Trash and Treasure

The Parish Council has approached the Borough Council re: setting up a paper bank. There are bottle banks in the Hawthorns and on the University campus and it appears that metal drinks cans fetch 1p each if collected. Is there any charitable group interested in collecting?

Keele Conservation Area

A meeting was held with Mr. Berman of the Borough Council to discuss the Conservation in Keele. Mr. Berman was very impressed with the new wall of the church and felt that given the amount of dry stone-walling in this lowland village, the Borough Council would consider restoring all the dry stone walls in the parish at some stage, should Keele become a conservation area. He also proposed that the village green could be landscaped and entrances to farms could be improved with choice planting of trees, especially as some of the limes are in need of replacement in the near future. It is envisaged that by April of next year Keele could be a conservation area and the boundary of the conservation area worked out.


Wombles
