
# The By-pass is a comin'....

Planning approval for the by-pass had been granted in May and the scheme had been included in the 1987 submission of the County Council's Transport, Policies and Programme for 1988-1993 to the Department of Transport with a suggested start date of 1988-89. A decision would be known at the end of the year. At the parish council meeting held in October, Councillors Cairns and Finnemore said that they believed work would commence early in 1988. The parish council agreed to write a letter to Llin Golding MP to thank her for her efforts on their behalf.

# And a new Clerk has arrived



## PARISH COUNCIL NEWS .....

## Keele Conserved



A public meeting to discuss the possibility of Keele being designated as a conservation area was convened in September when Mr. J. Berman from Newcastle Borough Planning & Development Department addressed those present.

A conservation area is one of architectural or historic interest and it is desirable to preserve or enhance it. In order to do this, there are certain implications such as controls e.g. control of demolition, control of development, control over advertisements and the protection of trees.

Enhancement of the designated area aimed to improve the quality of the environment and to improve the character and appearance of buildings and their setting in the area.

If a conservation area was designated, a resolution would be prepared by the Borough Council with a map showing the boundary of the conservation area. The Secretary of State and the Historic Buildings and Monuments Commission would be informed.

Mr. Berman believed that the by-pass would enhance Keele village and tree planting programmes could be pursued. Appeals for Phases 2 & 3 of the Conference Centre would need to be made, if Keele were to be a designated conservation area. There were then questions from the floor. About seven members of the parish were present. If anyone would like further information, minutes of the meeting can be consulted and obtained from the Parish Clerk.

The parish council agreed that a letter of thanks be sent to Mr Berman for his useful talk. A vote was taken at the recent parish council meeting and it was agreed by a majority that the parish council proceed to make Keele a designated conservation area.

## Reading

The rack for pamphlets and leaflets has now been erected in the foyer of the village hall. Parishioners are welcome to browse through the literature if they wish.

# Trimming ....

The holly hedge outside the Sneyd Arms car park has been trimmed, thus increasing visibility on the bend.

#### Painting ....

The Keele Milestone is to be painted white again.

# Arithmetic ....

The Parish Council has donated £10 to the Staffordshire Playing Fields Association.

# Dumping ....

It would appear that 2 mile lane alias Lyme Road has become a dumping ground for black refuse bags. The parish council wishes to point out that dumping is illegal and anyone seen doing so, should be reported.

### Building ....

The churchyard wall is half-way rebuilt and is looking very picturesque indeed. All those involved have done an excellent job and the appearance of the area around the churchyard has been greatly improved. It has been decided that the whole wall is to be re-built.

#### Way-Marking

The footpath between Keele and Madeley is to be way-marked. The Countryside Project is prepared to do this if the Council wishes.

## Parking

It appears that some PMT bus drivers are still parking way down Whitmore Road to avoid allowing passengers to board at the Whitmore Road bus stop. Even if buses are parked at the bus stop some drivers are still refusing to allow passengers to board. The parish council would like to point out that both practices are against the wishes of the bus company and the Council, and drivers doing this should be reported. Some drivers have expressed a fear that they would be mugged by students if they were to be allowed on the bus whilst the driver was counting his money. It is more than likely, however, that students would prefer to ask their parents or bank manager for more cash, than a bus driver.

#### Leaning on ....



Councillor Naylon pointed out that whilst walking at an angle of 35° he noted that the Whitmore Road sign was straight. Is this a conundrum? Answers on a rectangular postcard to the Parish Clerk who is perpendicular, or to the Chairman who is more circular.

The victorian lamp and stand will be erected shortly.

Councillors Cairns and Finnemore said that the Borough Council was prepared to purchase a small field in the Quarry Bank area for a toddlers' play area. The parish council agreed to wholeheartedly support this venture. It would be the Borough Council's responsibility to maintain it, but the parish council would be expected to contribute towards fencing and maintenance. It was generally felt that there was a need for such a facility here, as children were playing in the road at present. The Borough Council would now canvass all residents in the area.

Councillors Cairns and Finnemore reported that vandalism was increasing within the borough. Whilst flogging and drawing and quartering on the village green were ruled out as remedies, parishioners are invited to attend a meeting with the police to discuss the matter (increased vandalism) on 17th November at 7.30 pm at the Parksite Social Club.

#### Humps in the Road

The parish council has agreed to press for ramps on Quarry Bank Road to slow down traffic. Although there are certain difficulties to overcome, it was felt worthwhile if accidents were to be avoided

Speeding along Pepper Street is being monitored by the Police at present using radar, after a petition from residents was received.

The loose setts in Whitmore Road have been removed and the Borough Council are proposing a kerbing scheme.

## Lumps in the Road

It would appear that mud and water are issuing forth from the Conference Centre building site, making the road dangerous and the pavement impassable. Some pedestrians are using the road, given the slipperiness of the footpath.


