Ha, one, two, three, four, ...


"Ere we are, ere we are, ere we are again!"

At the meeting on 18th September, the Parish Council decided to hold an open forum at the end of meetings for a specified length of time. Parishioners have always been welcome in the past to contact or write to Parish Councillors if they wanted to raise a particular issue. Parishioners are still welcome to use this approach in addition to the new system. Should people wish to raise matters at these forums, it would be useful and discussion would be more profitable if advance notice, preferably in writing, could be given to the Clerk, Chairman or any other member of the Council. It is hoped that the open forum will act as a means of sorting out matters quickly and effectively rather than allowing them to irritate.

The other momentous change in the Parish which took place in the Summer was the face-lift to the Sneyd Arms. Well bowl us over with a pint of bitter! Parishioners and others were invited to pre-view the opening in August, by Ansells (the brewery) eager to show off their baby to the community. Would the regulars like it? PARISH COUNCIL NEWS ...

The drains in Keele continue to exhaust us. Although work has been carried out under the bridge in Station Road, water still collects there, causing a traffic hazard. The Borough Council have undertaken some remedial work here but to no avail.

They are asking that the matter be left until the bypass is built. However, the Parish Councillors felt that the matter should not be left until the bypass - no-one knows when this work is to be carried out - thus the Borough Council is to be contacted again. Keep floating!

Hedging

Although hedgecutting has taken place along some of the footways in Keele, the stretch from Madeley Heath to the village sign needs attention, especially around the bus stop sign and bus shelter in Station Road, i.e., those parts where the cutting machine did not reach.

Sheltering

The mysterious bus shelter, the one that suddenly appeared from somewhere, sited in Station Road is causing some concern. Some parishioners have contacted the Parish Council to say that they think it is in the wrong place. It is certainly poorly sited. The Parish Council, therefore, will send a letter to all those who are likely to use or do not use this shelter, asking their opinion about the site and whether or not they use it.

Way Marking

The way marking between Keele and Madeley has almost been finished. Some nice new gates have been erected. However, Dr Naylon has pointed out that the gate at Keele is a bit narrow for him and his filly to get through (we trust he meant his horse and not his wife!). It also needs digging out because it doesn't open properly. This Dr Naylon has volunteered to do.

Signing

It appears that one of the speed restriction signs has been erected upside down. The black stripe veres to the left whereas it should vere to the right. It was pointed out that we are a labour borough, after all. Nevertheless the Borough Council is to be asked to put it in the right way and cease this subtle form of political bias.

The Keele Parish sign is lorst and gorn (again). Would whoever removed it please return it.

Planning

Planning permission has been granted by the Parish Council for the following:-

Phase 2 of the Keele University Science Park.

Car parking spaces behind the Chemistry building, on the grassed area between Chancellor's Building and the Computer Centre and also at the side of the Walter Mobberly Hall have been approved by the Parish Council provided that replanting and landscaping takes place and that existing trees are protected.

Planning permission was refused for the vehicular access to the Golf Course; the granny annexe to Cherry Cottage and the residential development at Station Drive.

Mining

Castle Claysales had informed the Parish Council that clay from the reserves at Pepper Street was of an excellent quality but, for reasons that they were unwilling to disclose, it was unlikely that any extraction plans would go ahead. A letter had recently been received by the Parish Council stating that "...there are no current consents for marl extraction. Should any interested party wish to commence extraction then a planning application would have to be submitted for determination and the Parish Council would automatically be consulted."

Listing




Parish councillor: "Can I list your building, Sir."

The Borough Council has 'updated' their list of listed buildings. However, their list did not contain all the buildings in Keele that the Parish Council deemed worthy of listing. Therefore, a sub-committee was set up to look at all buildings in the parish that came within the criteria laid down for 'listed' buildings.

From a comprehensive list the following buildings were deemed to come within the DoE guidelines: Top Farm, the Sneyd Arms, Keele Farm House, The Workhouse, Home Farm buildings, The University Chapel, The Summer house and wrought iron gates at Larchwood. It was recommended that all owners of buildings should be contacted. The list is to be submitted to the Listings Authority for consideration.
